Internal evaluation is governed by university policies. The continuous internal assessment system examination committee develops the internal exam schedule in accordance with the college and university academic calendar rules. The continuous internal review was guided by university policies. The prepared schedule was made available to all students online. Timetables for exams are made and adhered to accordingly. Every faculty member in the class responded to the grievances after an internal evaluation. The sample responses were also discussed in class. To make sure the CIE academic calendar is successfully implemented, the college carries out internal assessments at the collegiate and institutional levels. To assess students' understanding, faculty members also give additional unit assessments in addition to university internal exams. More unit examinations are given by faculty to make sure students comprehend a subject. The continuous internal evaluation includes the internal test as well as the several assignments and seminars that students are given. The Academic Monitoring Committee confirms that the syllabus has been finished prior to the university exam. If not, it recommends that more lectures be scheduled by the department. To guarantee that the tests are given effectively, the examination committee convenes once a year. In order to further enhance the process, the committee also produces an annual report at the end of the academic year.

The Direct Method assesses program and course achievement through internal and external examinations. External exams are conducted by outside organizations, offering an unbiased assessment of how well desired outcomes are being met.

In contrast, the Indirect Method evaluates POs and COs through alternative means such as seminars, question-and-answer sessions, and other interactive platforms. These methods allow students to demonstrate their understanding, critical thinking skills, and practical application of what they have learned. Seminars give students the opportunity to present their ability to integrate and apply their knowledge, while question-and-answer sessions enable them to articulate their understanding and problem-solving skills in response to specific questions.

While the Direct Method focuses on theoretical knowledge and conceptual understanding through exams, the Indirect Method emphasizes application-oriented and communication skills demonstrated through seminars and discussions. By utilizing both methods, the institution provides a comprehensive evaluation that ensures programs and courses effectively meet learning outcomes and supports ongoing improvements in education quality.

Solid waste management: Solid waste management at the college involves daily collection and segregation of waste into dry and wet categories. Various bins are stationed across the college grounds for this purpose. In addition to this, vermicomposting is used to process organic waste. Municipal corporation trucks collect the segregated waste for proper disposal.

Liquid waste management: Liquid waste is managed through an internal drainage system connected to soak pits. Hazardous compounds are avoided in laboratories, and waste undergoes treatment before being drained. Efforts are made to dilute liquid waste during draining. Some wastes are incinerated, while biotechnology department waste is autoclaved before disposal into the drainage system.

Biomedical waste management: Biomedical waste, such as blood samples and microbial cultures, undergoes autoclaving in the biotechnology department for sterilization before safe disposal into the drainage

system.

E-waste management: E-waste management involves the collection, sorting, and recycling, with an emphasis on repairing and reusing electronic devices.

Waste recycling system:The college promotes waste recycling by directing wastewater to soak pits to potentially raise groundwater levels. Paper usage is minimized through digitization and an e-academic management system. Additionally, single-sided printouts from external sources are reused for rough purposes within the college, contributing to waste reduction efforts.

Solid waste management:Solid waste management at the college involves daily collection and segregation of waste into dry and wet categories. Various bins are stationed across the college grounds for this purpose. In addition to this, vermicomposting is used to process organic waste. Municipal corporation trucks collect the segregated waste for proper disposal.

Liquid waste management: Liquid waste is managed through an internal drainage system connected to soak pits. Hazardous compounds are avoided in laboratories, and waste undergoes treatment before being drained. Efforts are made to dilute liquid waste during draining. Some wastes are incinerated, while biotechnology department waste is autoclaved before disposal into the drainage system.

Biomedical waste management: Biomedical waste, such as blood samples and microbial cultures, undergoes autoclaving in the

biotechnology department for sterilization before safe disposal into the drainage system.

E-waste management: E-waste management involves the collection, sorting, and recycling, with an emphasis on repairing and reusing electronic devices.

Waste recycling system:The college promotes waste recycling by directing wastewater to soak pits to potentially raise groundwater levels. Paper usage is minimized through digitization and an e-academic management system. Additionally, single-sided printouts from external sources are reused for rough purposes within the college, contributing to waste reduction efforts.
